## "Of what sort of proof the principle of utility is susceptible"

- 4. Is happiness the only good-in-itself for Mill? Can there be others under his utilitarianism?
- 5. What is the distinction between will and desire? Why is it important?
- 6. Of what sort of proof *is* the utility principle susceptible?
